"Mimicry" is one of two critical terms ("hybridity" is the other) in Bhabha's criticism of post-colonial literature. Liminality (from the Latin word *līmen*, meaning "a threshold") is another key to Bhabha's postulations. It is, literally, the quality of the second stage of a ritual in the theories of Arnold van Gennep [1], Victor Turner [2], and others.

In "Of Mimicry and Man" Homi Bhabha lays out his concept of mimicry. Bhabha's essential argument is that mimicry can become unintentionally subversive, though the colonized, in the process of mimicry, rarely realizes he is undermining the powerful systems enacted by the colonizer.
